rain + coat = raincoat butter + fly = butterfly hair + cut = haircut

## Conjunctions

Conjunctions link 2 sentences together

and but because when if or

My daddy has brown eyes <u>and</u> he wears glasses.

Come and play <u>if</u> you are feeling sad.

We get a sticker <u>when</u> we have worked hard.

I am sad <u>because</u> my friend is moving to a new school.

You must get out of bed <u>or</u> you will be late for school.

He made a cup of tea <u>but</u> he did not drink it.

## Expanded noun phrase

The <u>big, red</u> tractor was in the field.

I held the <u>beautiful</u>, <u>silver</u> trophy in my hand.

# The suffix 'er'

Forms the comparative (comparing 2 things).

## The suffix 'est'

Forms the superlative (comparing 3 or more things).

young young<u>er</u> young<u>est</u> strong strong<u>er</u> strong<u>est</u>

## **Homophones**

Words that sound the same but have different meanings and different spellings I can (right / write) neatly. Put them over (their / there).

Where have you (bean / been)? I have got (for / four) cats.

## **Synonyms**

Synonyms are words that have almost the same meaning.

said giggled chuckled moaned yelled cried whispered

## Past/Past Progressive Tense

Yesterday I walk<u>ed</u> to school – past tense (already happened/complete)
Yesterday when I <u>was</u> walk<u>ing</u> to school I saw a dog. – past progressive (the action was an ongoing action in the past)
